THE PATRIARCH: MARTIN LUTHER KING SR. (DADDY KING)

**THE MATRIARCH: ALBERTA
WILLIAMS KING (MAMA KING)**

A Nurturing and Devoted Mother

Alberta Williams King, the mother of Martin Luther King Jr., was the quiet anchor of the family. The daughter of the Reverend Adam Daniel Williams, the influential pastor of Ebenezer Baptist Church before Daddy King, Alberta was raised in a home steeped in faith, music, and service. She was a highly educated woman, having attended Spelman Seminary and Hampton Institute. While her husband and son commanded the public spotlight, Mama King was the emotional and spiritual center of the household. She taught Martin the piano, instilled in him a love for music, and

cultivated his deep sense of empathy for others.

Strength in the Face of Tragedy

Alberta's life was marked by profound loss. She lost her first grandson when he tragically drowned in the family home. She endured the stabbing of her son at a book signing in Harlem. And she lived through the constant threats of violence against her family. Her faith was unwavering. During the Montgomery Bus Boycott, when the King home was bombed, it was Alberta who first calmed the terrified crowd, reminding them that they had "no weapon but love."

A Tragic End

Tragically, Alberta Williams King was killed on June 30, 1974, while playing the organ at a Sunday morning service at Ebenezer Baptist Church. She was shot by a deranged gunman. Her death was a devastating loss for the family and the nation. While often overshadowed by the more prominent figures among Martin Luther King family members, Alberta's role as a nurturer, educator, and quiet pillar of faith was essential to the success of the movement.

THE SIBLINGS: CHRISTINE KING FARRIS AND A. D. KING

Christine King Farris: The Keeper of the Legacy

Christine King Farris, the only surviving sibling of Martin Luther King Jr. for many years, served as a powerful advocate for her brother's memory. Born in 1927, she was the eldest of the three King children. Christine was an accomplished educator, teaching at Spelman College for nearly five decades. She was fiercely protective of her brother's legacy, founding the Martin Luther King Jr. Center for

Nonviolent Social Change alongside Coretta Scott King. She wrote several books about her family, including *My Brother Martin*, a children's book that offers an intimate and joyful portrait of their childhood. Among the Martin Luther King family members, Christine was the longest-living direct link to the civil rights icon, passing away in 2023 at the age of 95.

A. D. King: The Loyal Younger Brother

Alfred Daniel Williams King, known as A. D., was Martin's younger brother and

closest confidant. Born in 1930, A. D. followed in his brother's footsteps, becoming a Baptist minister and civil rights activist. He was deeply involved in the Birmingham Campaign and the Selma to Montgomery marches. While he lacked Martin's global stature, A. D. was a courageous leader in his own right, often stepping in when Martin was in danger or behind bars. The relationship between the brothers was complicated by jealousy and competition at times, but their bond of love and shared mission was unbreakable. A. D. King's life was cut short when he tragically drowned in his backyard pool in 1969, just one year after his brother's assassination.

More Than a First Lady of the Movement

Coretta Scott King is perhaps the most significant figure among Martin Luther King family members after Martin himself. Often described as the "First Lady of the Civil Rights Movement," Coretta was far more than a supportive spouse. She was a trained musician, a committed pacifist, and a formidable strategist in her own right. She met Martin while studying at the New

England Conservatory of Music in Boston, and their partnership was built on intellectual equality and shared values. Coretta was the one who convinced Martin to fully commit to nonviolence, even when he had doubts.

Leading After the Assassination

After Martin's assassination in 1968, Coretta could have retreated into private grief. Instead, she stepped forward with remarkable courage. She led the Poor People's Campaign that Martin had been organizing. She founded the Martin Luther King Jr. Center for Nonviolent Social Change in Atlanta. She was instrumental in the years-long fight to

establish Martin Luther King Jr. Day as a federal holiday, a campaign she saw through to success in 1986. Coretta also became a global voice for peace, speaking out against apartheid in South Africa and advocating for LGBTQ+ rights, a stance that was controversial within the African American community at the time.

A Legacy of Activism

Coretta Scott King published her memoir, *My Life with Martin Luther King Jr.*, and remained an active public figure until her death in 2006. Her role among Martin Luther King family members is one of indomitable strength and

visionary leadership. She proved that the struggle for justice continues beyond any single individual.

THE CHILDREN: CARRYING THE TORCH

Yolanda Denise King (1955–2007)

Yolanda, the eldest child, was named after her mother's favorite aunt, Yolanda. She was often thrust into the public eye as a child, but she grew up to forge her own path as an actress, artist, and activist. She understood the weight

of her father's name but used it to promote the arts and education. Yolanda was a graduate of Smith College and worked in theater and film production. She passed away suddenly in 2007 at the age of 51. Her legacy among Martin Luther King family members is one of creative expression and gentle advocacy.

Martin Luther King III (b. 1957)

Martin Luther King III, the second child and only son to bear his father's exact name, has spent his life navigating the immense expectations that come with that legacy. He has served as the president of the Southern Christian

Leadership Conference (SCLC) and the Martin Luther King Jr. Center. More recently, he has been a vocal advocate for voting rights, economic justice, and police reform. While he has faced criticism for not achieving the same level of prominence as his father, King III has remained a steadfast presence in the ongoing fight for civil rights, emphasizing that the work is about "building the beloved community," a concept his father championed.

Dexter Scott King

(1961–2024)

Dexter Scott King, named after Dexter Avenue Baptist Church in Montgomery where his father first preached, was perhaps the most private of the King children. He served as the chairman of the King Center and was deeply involved in preserving his father's intellectual property. Dexter struggled with the burden of his father's legacy but dedicated himself to protecting the family's history. He passed away in January 2024 after a battle with prostate cancer. Among Martin Luther King family members, Dexter was known for his quiet determination and his work to ensure the authenticity of his father's writings and speeches.

Bernice Albertine King (b. 1963)

The youngest of the King children, Bernice Albertine King, was just five years old when her father was assassinated. She initially resisted the call to public life, training as a lawyer and later becoming an ordained minister. As the CEO of the King Center, Bernice has worked to refocus the organization on nonviolence education and spiritual activism. She is a powerful preacher in her own right, often speaking at Ebenezer Baptist Church and around the world. Bernice has also been outspoken in her advocacy for social justice, gun control, and gender equality.

She represents the future of the King legacy among the living Martin Luther King family members.

Yolanda Renee King: The New Voice
