The film's title is a reference to the drag queen mantra of gratitude, and the protagonists constantly evoke the spirit of their idol, actress Julie Newmar (most famous

as Catwoman in the 1960s "Batman" TV series).

Why the Title Matters

The full title, **To Wong Foo Thanks For Everything, Julie Newmar**, is a direct nod to the drag culture inside joke of thanking a celebrity for everything—a tradition that recognizes the joy and inspiration that icons provide.
