This leads to strategic voting and often results in winners who lack majority support. Hill champions Instant Runoff Voting, also known as ranked-choice voting, as a superior alternative. In an IRV system, voters rank candidates in order of preference. If no candidate wins a majority, the last-place candidate is eliminated, and their votes are redistributed to the voters' second choices. This process continues until one candidate has a majority. STEP 5: NONPARTISAN REDISTRICTING

Gerrymandering is the practice of drawing legislative district lines to

benefit one party over another. It is a bipartisan scourge that allows politicians to choose their voters, rather than the other way around. This creates safe seats, reduces competition, and drives politicians to the extremes (since only primary voters matter in non-competitive districts). Hill calls for taking the redistricting pen out of the hands of partisan legislatures and giving it to independent, nonpartisan commissions. States like California, Arizona, and Michigan have shown that this is not only possible but also leads to more competitive elections and a legislature that better reflects the state's political diversity. Reform of redistricting is essential to breaking the cycle of polarization and gridlock.

STEP 6: PUBLIC CAMPAIGN FINANCING

The influence of big money in politics is a cancer on democracy. When candidates must spend vast amounts of time fundraising, they become beholden to wealthy donors and special interests. Hill advocates for a system of public campaign financing, often referred to as "clean elections." Under this model, candidates who agree to strict spending limits and refuse large private donations receive a set amount of public funds to run their campaigns.
