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## SEASONAL CONSIDERATIONS AND MAP READING

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The best time to use a map of Tuscany

and Umbria is in spring (April to June) and fall (September to October). The weather is mild, and the landscapes are vibrant. Summer can be hot and crowded, while winter brings snow to Umbrian mountains and fog to Tuscan valleys. A good map will include elevation data, helping you anticipate climate differences.
