Problem 1: Solve for x: $5(x - 2) + 3x = 2(x + 4)$

Strategy: Start by distributing on both sides: $5x - 10 + 3x = 2x + 8$. Combine like terms on the left: $8x - 10 = 2x + 8$. Get all x terms on one side by subtracting 2x from both sides: $6x - 10 = 8$. Add 10 to both sides: $6x = 18$. Divide by 6: $x = 3$. Problem 2: What is the equation of the line that passes through the points (-1, 4) and (2, -2)?

Using the point (-1, 4), we get: $y - 4 = -2(x + 1)$. Simplify to slope-intercept form: $y - 4 = -2x - 2$, so $y = -2x + 2$.

Problem 3: Factor completely: $x^2 + 7x + 12$

Strategy: Look for two numbers that multiply to 12 (the constant term) and add up to 7 (the coefficient of the x term). The numbers are 3 and 4. Therefore, the factored form is $(x + 3)(x + 4)$. Always multiply your factors back together to double-check your work.
