COMMON INTERVIEW QUESTIONS FOR SUBSTITUTE TEACHERS AND HOW TO ANSWER THEM

Below we break down the most frequently asked questions, grouped by category, along with sample approaches. Use these as a guide, but always personalize your responses with real experiences or sincere intentions.

1. "Why do you want to be a substitute teacher?"

This question tests your motivation. Avoid generic answers like "I need a job." Instead, highlight your passion for education and flexibility. For example:

"I enjoy the variety that substitute teaching offers. Every day is different, and I love the challenge of stepping into new classrooms, connecting with students, and ensuring their learning continues seamlessly. It also allows me to support multiple teachers and schools in my community."

2. "How do you handle classroom management when you have no established relationship with students?"

Classroom management is the number one concern for substitute teachers. Interviewers want to know you can assert authority respectfully. Focus on strategies like:

3. "What would you do if a student refuses to follow your instructions?"

This is a behavioral question that calls for a problem-solving mindset. Outline a step-by-step approach:

1. Stay calm and avoid a power struggle.
2. Privately speak to the student to understand the issue.
3. Offer choices: "You can complete the assignment quietly at your desk, or you can move to the back table to work."
4. If non-compliance continues, follow the school's protocol (call the office, assign a reflective break).

A strong answer: *"I would first try a private conversation. Often, students act out because they feel unheard. I'd say, 'I see you're not getting started. Can you tell me what's going on?' If that fails, I use the school's referral system while ensuring the rest of the class remains engaged."*

4. "How do you handle a

lesson plan that is incomplete or unclear?"

Substitutes often face incomplete plans. Show resourcefulness. Mention that you would:

- Check the teacher's desk, digital files, or common materials.
- Contact the front office or nearby teacher for guidance.
- Prepare backup activities like review games, educational videos, or reading time.
- Leave a note for the teacher about what was covered.

Example: *"If the plan is vague, I first check for any handouts or digital resources. If nothing is there, I use a standard 'sub folder' activity I carry—like a quick writing prompt or a math puzzle. I always follow up with a detailed note for the regular teacher."*

5. "Tell us about a time you had to adapt quickly. How did you handle it?"

Behavioral interview questions for substitute teachers often require a real-life story. Use the STAR method (Situation, Task, Action, Result).

For example: *"Recently, I was assigned to a high school biology class but the lesson plan was for a lab I couldn't facilitate because materials were missing. I quickly designed a group discussion on lab safety and designed a mini-quiz. The students stayed engaged, and the teacher appreciated the creative solution."*

SCENARIO-BASED QUESTIONS: THINK ON YOUR FEET

Interviewers may present hypothetical scenarios to see how you analyze problems. Here are common ones:

Scenario 1: "You are covering a kindergarten class and a child has a meltdown. What do you do?"

Focus on de-escalation and safety. Emphasize empathy and redirecting. Example: *"I would kneel to the child's eye level, use a calm voice, and acknowledge their feelings. Then I would offer a quiet corner with a calming book. If the behavior continues, I'd ask for assistance from a teacher's aide."*

Scenario 2: "A student tells you they are feeling unsafe at home. How do you respond?"

This tests your knowledge of mandatory reporting. *"I would listen without judgment and reassure the student that they are safe with me. Then, immediately after class, I would report the disclosure to the school counselor or principal following the school's safeguarding policy."*

Scenario 3: "You are covering for a teacher who left no lesson plan at all."

Show preparation: *"I would have a backup kit: age-appropriate worksheets, a book to read aloud, a writing prompt, or a simple educational game. I'd also ask neighboring teachers what the class was studying. The goal is to keep students productive."*

QUESTIONS YOU SHOULD ASK THE INTERVIEWER

- **"How does the school support substitute teachers in terms of classroom management training?"**
