THE FINAL CURTAIN CALL: ANSWERING "WHAT YEAR DID HIGH SCHOOL MUSICAL 3 COME OUT?"

THE STELLAR CAST AND THEIR GROWN-UP ROLES

By 2008, the cast of **High School Musical 3** had become global superstars. The theatrical release allowed them to flex their acting and dancing muscles in ways the television format never could.

Zac Efron (Troy Bolton): He carried the film as the lead. His performance in the rain-soaked, emotional number "Scream" showed a level of angst and maturity that was new for the character. He choreographed much of his own dancing for the "Bet On It" sequence in the previous film, and in this one, he was given even more demanding physical routines.

Her dynamic with new character Tiara Gold (Jemma McKenzie-Brown) provides comedic relief.

Corbin Bleu (Chad Danforth) and Monique Coleman (Taylor McKessie): These two supporting characters are given more screen time. Chad struggles with the idea of losing his best friend Troy to college, while Taylor tries to balance her leadership role with her own fears about the future.

The cast chemistry was so strong that many of the actors have admitted in interviews that the final scenes of the movie were not hard to act out; the tears were genuine as they truly were saying goodbye to a huge chapter of their lives.

PRODUCTION AND MUSIC: RAISING THE BAR

When fans ask "What year did High School Musical 3 come out?" they often associate it with the massive marketing campaign and the album release. The soundtrack for **HSM3** was a massive commercial success, debuting at number two on the Billboard 200 chart. The music had evolved from the pop-synth sound of the first two films to a more mature, Broadway-influenced style.

Key Musical Numbers That Defined 2008

The choreography by Kenny Ortega was more ambitious than ever. The production numbers were designed for the widescreen format. "A Night to Remember" features a massive ensemble dance in the school gym with complex lifts and spins.
