thick, add a drop of polish thinner (not acetone or nail polish remover). If it is too thin, add a small amount of clear base or a pinch of stearalkonium hectorite, a thickening agent used in cosmetics.

Step 6: Transfer to the Bottle

Using a funnel, pour the mixed polish into your empty glass bottle. Tap the bottle gently on the counter to release any air bubbles. Wipe the bottle neck clean before screwing on the cap tightly.

Step 7: Label and Cure

Label your bottle with the color name and date. Allow the polish to sit upright for 12–24 hours before use. This resting period lets the ingredients fully combine and stabilizes the viscosity.

You can also add a small amount of bentonite clay to increase viscosity without affecting color.
