Preparing the

Template and S Folding Techniques

Once you have your **Full Size Neostead 2000 Ns 2000 Pump Action Slide Shotgun Paper Model Download**, the first step is printing. Use a good quality printer and select **cardstock** of at least 200 gsm for durability. For extra rigidity, you can print on regular paper and later glue sheets onto thin cardboard. Print all pages and check the test print for alignment. Lay the pages flat and allow any moisture to evaporate (inkjet prints need time to dry).

Use a sharp hobby knife with a fresh blade to cut along the outlines. A steel ruler is essential for straight cuts. For curved parts, make small, gentle cuts. Score fold lines using a bone folder or the back of the knife blade (pressing lightly to create a crease). This ensures crisp, clean folds. Practice folding on scrap paper first, especially for the tubular magazine sections.

Cutting

- **Cutting:** Always cut on a self-healing mat to protect your

table. Cut tabs with precision—they hold the model together.

- **Folding:** Use a bone folder or a plastic card to crease. Fold tabs inward or outward as per instructions. Some templates use a “flap and slot” system; check the 3D preview if using Pepakura.
- **Gluing:** Apply a thin layer of white glue (PVA) or a glue stick. Tacky glue is best as it grabs quickly. Use toothpicks to apply to small tabs.

Assembly Sequence

Start with the largest structural components. Typically, the receiver (the main body) is built first, followed by the stock, barrel, and then the pump slide and magazine tubes. Follow these general steps:

1. **Stock and Butt:**
Assemble the rear section. This often includes a shoulder pad piece. Reinforce the interior with folded strips of cardstock to prevent sagging.
2. **Receiver Body:**
Build the main housing around the trigger area. This is where the bullpup layout makes the

geometry
complex—take
your time
aligning edges.

3. **Pump Slide and**

Forend: The pump mechanism on a real Neostead slides along the barrel. For the paper model, you can create a movable slide by leaving the forend unattached at the sides or using a sliding channel made from paper straws. Many builders simply glue it fixed for display.

4. **Dual**

Magazines: These are the two tubes sitting above the barrel. They are cylindrical and

need careful rolling. Use a pen or dowel to shape them into uniform cylinders before gluing the seam. Attach them to the top of the receiver.

5. **Barrel and**

Muzzle: A long tube that extends forward. Add reinforcing rings if provided.

6. **Trigger and**

Details: Small parts like the trigger, selector switch, and sights. Use tweezers for handling tiny pieces.

The entire build may take 15-25 hours over several days. Take breaks to avoid fatigue. If this is your first complex paper model, consider a simpler test build first.

DISPLAY AND CUSTOMIZATION

Once your **Full Size Neostead 2000 Ns 2000 Pump Action Slide Shotgun Paper Model** is assembled, you can take it to the next level with finishing touches. The raw paper look can be appealing, but painting and weathering make it appear more realistic. Use acrylic paints sparingly—test on spare pieces first. A light spray of matte varnish can protect the surface. If you want a functional pump slide, you can install a simple internal track using strips of thin plastic or stiff cardstock so the forend moves back and forth. This is advanced but impressive.

For display, consider building a simple wall mount from a wooden

plaque with clips. Or use a mannequin hand for a futuristic photo shoot. Because the model is paper, keep it away from moisture and direct sunlight to prevent fading or warping. You can also add a “orange tip” if you plan to take it to a convention or public area—this is legally required in many jurisdictions to distinguish it from a real firearm.
