ESSENTIAL INGREDIENTS FOR A FLAVORFUL SLOW COOKER LAMB

STEP-BY-STEP GUIDE: HOW TO COOK ROAST LAMB IN A SLOW COOKER

Step 1: Prepare and Sear the Lamb

Step 2: Build the

Aromatic Base

While the lamb is searing, prepare your slow cooker. Add roughly chopped onions, carrots, and celery to the bottom of the slow cooker insert. Tuck in several whole cloves of garlic and a few sprigs of fresh rosemary and thyme. Once the lamb is seared, transfer it to the slow cooker, placing it on top of the vegetable bed.

Step 3: Deglaze the Pan and Add

Liquid

After the lamb is removed, your skillet will have delicious browned bits stuck to the bottom. This is pure flavour. Return the pan to medium heat and pour in about a cup of your chosen liquid (red wine or stock). Use a wooden spoon or spatula to scrape up all those browned bits from the bottom of the pan. Let the liquid simmer for a minute to reduce slightly. If using tomato paste, you can stir it into the pan at this point and cook for another 30 seconds. Pour this deglazing liquid over the lamb in the slow cooker. Add enough additional stock to come about a third of the way up the side of the lamb. Do not submerge the meat; you are braising,

not boiling it.

Step 4: The Slow Cook

Place the lid securely on the slow cooker. The cooking time will depend on the size of your roast and the heat setting you choose. For a 2-3 kg shoulder roast, **how to cook roast lamb in a slow cooker** typically involves these timings:

- **Low and Slow (Recommended):** 8-10 hours on LOW. This is the best method for maximum tenderness and flavour development.
- **Faster Option:** 5-7 hours on HIGH. While this will work, the

meat may not be as melt-in-your-mouth tender as the low-and-slow method.

You will know the lamb is done when a fork or a sharp knife slides into the meat with almost no resistance, and the meat is starting to pull away from the bone easily.

HOW TO MAKE A RICH GRAVY FROM THE COOKING JUICES

1. **Strain the Liquid:** Pour the cooking juices through a fine-mesh sieve into a heatproof bowl or large measuring cup. Press down on the vegetables to extract as much flavour as possible, then discard the solids.
2. **Skim the Fat:** The liquid will contain a significant amount of fat from the lamb. Use a spoon or a fat separator to skim off the excess fat. Leave a little bit for flavour, but remove most of it.
3. **Thicken the Gravy:** Pour the strained, defatted liquid into a saucepan. Bring it to a simmer over medium heat. In a small bowl, whisk together two tablespoons of cornstarch with three tablespoons of cold water to create a slurry.

While whisking the simmering liquid constantly, slowly pour in the slurry. Continue to whisk until the gravy thickens to your liking, which should only take a minute or two. Season with salt and pepper to taste.
