This pattern teaches the fundamental hooking motion that is used in almost every other design. Though basic, you can make it look interesting by using multiple colors in a rainbow sequence.

The Fishtail Bracelet

One of the most popular beginner patterns, the fishtail is easy to learn and produces a braided look. It works well on a small two-pronged loom or even using two fingers. You start with a figure-eight band on two pegs, then add two more bands without twisting. Using the hook, you bring the bottom bands up and over the pegs. Repeat this pattern, alternating colors if you wish. The fishtail bracelet lies flat and has a tactile, woven appearance. Many people make stacks of fishtails in different color combos and wear them together.

The Twisted Fishtail (or Double Fishtail)

A slight variation on the classic fishtail, this pattern adds a twist. After placing the initial figure-eight band, you twist each subsequent band before adding it to the pegs. This creates a spiral effect along the bracelet. The twisted fishtail is still very beginner-friendly but looks more intricate. It is an excellent next step after mastering the standard fishtail.

INTERMEDIATE PATTERNS: STEPPING UP YOUR LOOM GAME

Once you are comfortable with basic weaves, you can explore patterns that use more pegs and more complex motions. These **patterns for rubber band loom bracelets** require a bit more concentration but yield impressive results.

The Hexagon or Starburst Bracelet

The hexagon pattern uses six pegs arranged in a hexagon shape (common on larger looms). It involves creating a central star pattern with bands radiating outward, then layering additional bands and hooking them over to form a thick, honeycomb-like structure. This is one of the most recognizable designs, often called the "rainbow loom" pattern because it shows off multiple colors beautifully. The key is to follow the order of looping carefully. Once you master the hexagon, you can customize it by using gradient colors or alternating every other row.

The Diamond Bracelet

The diamond pattern creates a series of diamond shapes along the bracelet. It requires alternating color pairs and careful hooking from the center out. This pattern looks best when you use two contrasting colors. The diamonds appear as inverted V-shapes that interlock. It is a bit more challenging than the hexagon because you have to keep track of which bands are on which pegs. But the result is worth the effort - a bracelet that looks almost woven.

The Triple Single Chain

This pattern combines three single chains that are linked together. You start by making three separate single chain strips, but instead of finishing each one, you interlock them as you go. The final bracelet is like a thick, triple-braided rope. It is sturdy and perfect for times when you want a chunkier look. Using three different colors makes the interlocking effect stand out.

ADVANCED PATTERNS: FOR THE DEDICATED LOOMER

For those who have made dozens of bracelets and are craving a challenge, advanced patterns can take hours to complete but are stunning works of wearable art. These **patterns for rubber band loom bracelets** often involve multiple looms, complex geometric shapes, or 3D techniques.

The Dragon Scale (or Scale) Bracelet

The dragon scale pattern creates a raised, scaly texture reminiscent of reptilian skin. It typically uses a multi-layering technique. You start by placing a row of bands in a specific pattern (often over two rows of pegs), then you weave additional bands through the centers of the previous loops. The result is a bracelet that looks like overlapping scales. This pattern can be done in monochrome for a subtle effect or in iridescent colors for a truly mythical appearance. It is not recommended for beginners because it requires precise hook placement and a good understanding of tension.

The Flower or Bloom Pattern

This pattern creates small flower shapes along the bracelet. It involves making individual "petals" using multiple bands on a group of pegs, then joining them together. The flower pattern can be done as a single row of blooms or as a wide band with multiple flowers side by side. It is time-consuming but very rewarding. You can add a bead to the center of each flower for extra sparkle.

The 3D Loom Bracelet (Spiral or Tube)

A 3D bracelet uses the circular shape of the loom to create a tube that is hollow inside. This pattern requires a round loom or a special 3D loom. You place bands around the entire circle, then hook them continuously to form a cylinder. The result is a bracelet that looks like a thick rope or a mini

scarf. It is flexible and can be worn as a bracelet or even as a small necklace. This is one of the most advanced **patterns for rubber band loom bracelets** and requires careful counting to avoid tangles.

TIPS FOR PERFECTING YOUR LOOM BRACELET PATTERNS

No matter which pattern you choose, a few universal tips will help your bracelets turn out neat and durable.

- **Maintain consistent tension.** Too loose and the bracelet will sag; too tight and it may snap or become stiff. Practice until your hooking motion is even.
- **Use the correct hook.** A metal hook can sometimes snag bands; many crafters prefer the plastic hooks that come with kits because they are smoother.
- **Watch your band orientation.** Some patterns require bands to be twisted (figure-eight) only at the start. Make sure you follow instructions carefully because a single twist changes the weave.
- **Keep bands untangled.** Store your bands sorted by color. When working, avoid dumping all bands on the table - use small containers to prevent knots.
- **Practice with solid colors first.** Striped or multicolored patterns can be confusing if you are still learning the motions. Once you master the technique, then experiment with color placement.

Common Mistakes and How to Fix Them
