SCORING AND UNDERSTANDING YOUR RESULTS

The CLEP Spanish Language Examination is scored on a scale from 20 to 80. The American Council on Education (ACE) recommends a score of 50 for granting credit for two semesters of introductory Spanish, and a score of 63 for four semesters. However, each college sets its own passing score and credit award policy. Some institutions may require a higher score for upper-level credit, while others
