Disneyland Paris (RER A), Versailles (RER C), or the airports, you will need a separate, more expensive ticket. Always check your map for zone boundaries. To avoid this, look for the special "Île-de-France" tickets at the machines, which are clearly marked for destination specific zones.

Today, you can also use contactless credit cards or your smartphone with Apple Pay or Google Pay on the new Navigo Easy passes. These modern payment methods are incredibly convenient. Simply tap your phone at the gate to enter and exit. Regardless of

the method you choose, always keep your ticket or phone handy until you exit the station, as random ticket inspections are common.

Navigating the RER: A Different Beast

While the Metro is your primary tool for getting around central Paris, the RER is a high-speed suburban rail network that connects the city to its outskirts. On your Paris Metro Map in English, the RER lines are usually displayed as thicker, dashed lines in different colors (RER A

is red, RER B is blue, RER C is yellow). The RER is faster over long distances because it makes fewer stops. However, it can be confusing for first-timers.

The key difference is that you must validate your ticket both when entering and when **exiting** the RER system. If you fail to do so, the exit gates will not open, and you may be fined.
