If the veins are difficult, lower the arm below heart level, use a warm compress for a few minutes, or tap the skin gently.

## The Draw Process

Clean the site with an antiseptic wipe using a circular motion from the center outward; allow it to dry completely (about 30 seconds). Anchor the vein by pulling the skin taut about 1-2 inches below the puncture site. Insert the needle at a 15-30 degree angle, bevel up, in the direction of the blood flow. You will feel a slight “give” as the needle enters the vein. Advance the needle about one-quarter inch, then attach the tube holder or butterfly adapter.

Fill the tubes in the correct order, gently inverting each tube (except the first blood culture) to mix additives. When the last tube is full, release the tourniquet. Place a gauze pad over the puncture site and withdraw the needle carefully. Apply firm pressure to the site for 2-3 minutes (or longer if the patient is anticoagulated). Label the tubes immediately in front of the patient, then dispose of the used needle into the sharps container.

## COMMON CHALLENGES AND SOLUTIONS

Wash your hands before and after gloving, and sanitize the collection area. All sharps must be placed in approved puncture-proof containers immediately after use. Needle recapping is prohibited.

Disinfect surfaces (chairs, counters, tourniquets) between patients with EPA-approved wipes. For patients with known bloodborne infections, follow your facility’s isolation protocols. Finally, keep your vaccinations up to date, including Hepatitis B.
