HOW TO CREATE YOUR OWN FOOTBALL PRACTICE PLAN TEMPLATE IN EXCEL

You don’t need to be an Excel expert to build a functional practice planner. Follow these step-by-step instructions to design a template that suits your needs.

Step 1: Set Up Columns

Open a new workbook. In row 1, input headers: **Time Start**, **Time End**, **Duration (min)**, **Activity**, **Position**, **Coaching Points**, **Equipment**, **Notes**. Adjust column widths so text is readable.

Step 2: Use Formulas for Efficiency

In the Duration column, enter a formula that subtracts start time from end time and multiplies by 1440 (to convert to minutes). For example, if B2 is start and C2 is end, use $= (C2 - B2) * 1440$ and format the cell as a number. This automatically calculates how long each drill runs.

At the bottom of the Duration column, use $= \text{SUM}(D2:D20)$ to total practice length. You can also set conditional formatting to turn a cell red if total exceeds your target time (e.g., 120 minutes).

Step 3: Add Color Coding

Excel's conditional formatting or manual fill colors help visually separate practice phases. For example, use light blue for warm-up, green for individual drills, yellow for group periods, orange for team scrimmage, and gray for cool-down. This makes your

Step 4: Include Dropdown Lists

BEST PRACTICES FOR MAXIMIZING YOUR FOOTBALL PRACTICE PLAN TEMPLATE

Keep It Realistic

It's tempting to pack in 15 drills, but quality beats quantity. Use your template to enforce a maximum of 8-10 main segments per practice. Factor in transition time between drills (2-3 minutes) to account for water breaks and moving players. A good rule: total practice length = sum of drill times + (10% for transitions).

Align with Your Season Objectives

Total duration should sum to 115 minutes (allowing 5 minutes for schedule flexibility). Add Notes and coaching points columns to the right. This structure provides a solid foundation you can modify for any age or skill level.

CUSTOMIZING YOUR FOOTBALL PRACTICE PLAN TEMPLATE FOR DIFFERENT LEVELS

A template that works for a youth team (ages 8-10) will look different from one designed for a high school varsity squad or even a college team. Consider these adjustments:

- **Youth/Developmental:** Shorter practice times (60-75 minutes). Fewer position-specific blocks. More emphasis on basic motor skills and fun. Your **football practice plan**
