- **Elevated:** Systolic 120–129 mmHg and diastolic less than 80 mmHg. This indicates a higher risk of developing hypertension, and lifestyle changes are recommended.
- **Stage 1 Hypertension:** Systolic 130–139 mmHg or diastolic 80–89 mmHg. Medical attention is advised, along with lifestyle modifications.
- **Stage 2 Hypertension:** Systolic 140 mmHg or higher or diastolic 90 mmHg or higher. This requires prompt medical treatment, often including medication.
- **Hypertensive Crisis:** Systolic over 180 mmHg and/or diastolic over 120 mmHg. This is a medical emergency.

Understanding these categories is crucial because hypertension is often called the "silent killer"—it can cause damage for years without noticeable symptoms. Regular monitoring is the only way to know if your blood pressure is in the perfect range.

- **Caffeine:** Caffeine can cause a short-term spike in blood pressure, especially in people who are not regular consumers. However, its long-term effects are still debated.
