- **F# minor (F#m)** – 2-4-4-2-2-2 (244222). Used in the pre-chorus

and bridge to create a subtle shift in mood.

- **E minor (Em)** - 0-2-2-0-0-0 (022000). Appears briefly in the bridge as a passing chord.

If you are using a capo on the 2nd fret, the shapes become C, F, G, Am, Em, and Dm (though the actual sound remains in D major). This can make the chords easier for players who struggle with barred Bm.

Chord Progression Breakdown

The song follows a common verse-chorus-bridge structure. Let's examine each section:

VERSE

The verse uses a repeating pattern: **D - G - A - Bm**. This four-chord loop provides a stable foundation. The gentle arpeggiation in the original recording gives it a tender quality. On guitar, you can play each chord as a strum or break them into fingerpicking patterns.

PRE-CHORUS

The pre-chorus introduces **F#m - G - A - D**. The F#m creates a sudden shift from the major-tonic feel, emphasizing the emotional buildup. This section often repeats twice before the chorus.

CHORUS

The chorus is built around **D - G - A - Bm** again, but the rhythm changes. The strumming becomes more energetic, and vocal delivery becomes more

emphatic. The repetition of the same chord sequence as the verse is a clever way to keep the song cohesive while letting the lyrics and melody shine.

BRIDGE

The bridge explores **Em - A - D - Bm - G - A - D**. This is the most harmonically diverse section. The Em chord (ii) gives a fleeting sense of tension before resolving back to D. The bridge's lyrics ("Today was a fairytale...") are a climactic highlight that pays off the entire song.

STRUMMING PATTERNS AND RHYTHM TIPS

The original recording features a gentle, steady eighth-note strum pattern with occasional accent beats. For guitar, a good beginner pattern is:

1. Down, down-up, up-down-up (D DU UDU) – this is often called the "folk pattern" and fits perfectly.
2. Alternatively, use a straight down-up eighth-note strum (1 & 2 & 3 & 4 &) with emphasis on beats 1 and 3.
3. For a more advanced feel, incorporate a slight swing or add ghost strums between chords.

Remember that the **Today Was a Fairytale chords** are not technically difficult, so the emotion and dynamics come from your strumming hand. Soften your touch during verses and increase intensity at the chorus. It is also effective to let certain chords ring out by lifting your strumming hand slightly.

PIANO PLAYERS: VOICINGS AND INVERSIONS

Piano players can approach the song in a straightforward way with root position

chords, but inversions create smoother voice leading. Here are some suggested voicings:

- **D major:** D – F# – A (root position) or F# – A – D (first inversion).
- **G major:** G – B – D (root) or B – D – G (first inversion).
- **A major:** A – C# – E (root) or C# – E – A (first inversion).
- **B minor:** B – D – F# (root) or D – F# – B (first inversion).
- **F# minor:** F# – A – C# (root) or A – C# – F# (first inversion).
- **E minor:** E – G – B (root) or G – B – E (first inversion).

In the bridge, switching from D to Bm to G while keeping the same top note (F#) can create a beautiful, connected sound. Experiment with arpeggiated left-hand patterns (e.g., root, fifth, root, octave) to mimic the guitar's feel.

LYRICS AND MUSICAL STORYTELLING

Understanding the lyrics can help you shape your performance. The song tells a story of a magical day that feels like a fairytale. The chords support this narrative: the bright D major establishes the happiness, while B minor introduces vulnerability, especially in lines like “I don’t know what’s happening to me.” The pre-chorus’s F# minor hints at doubt, but the chorus resolves with triumphant certainty. VARIATIONS AND ADVANCED INTERPRETATIONS

- **Banjo or ukulele:** The chords adapt easily to other instruments. On ukulele (tuning GCEA), the chords become D (2220), G (0232), A (2100), Bm (4222), F#m (2120), Em (0402).
