DETAILED WALKTHROUGH OF FE MECHANICAL SAMPLE QUESTIONS

Sample Question 1: Dynamics

Problem: A 5 kg block is released from rest on a frictionless 30-degree incline. It slides 10 meters down the incline. Using the work-energy principle, determine the velocity of the block at the bottom of the incline.

Solution: The work-energy principle states that the net work done on an object equals its change in kinetic energy. The only force doing work on the block is gravity (component parallel to the incline). The force parallel to the incline is $F = mg \sin(\theta) = 5 * 9.81 * \sin(30^\circ) = 24.525 \text{ N}$. The work done is $W = F * d = 24.525 \text{ N} * 10 \text{ m} = 245.25 \text{ J}$. This work equals the change in kinetic energy: $245.25 \text{ J} = (1/2) * m * v^2$. Solving for v : $v = \sqrt{2 * 245.25 / 5} = \sqrt{98.1} = 9.90 \text{ m/s}$. This straightforward problem highlights the power of energy methods.

Sample Question 2: Thermodynamics

Problem: Steam at 2 MPa and 300°C enters an adiabatic turbine and exits at 50 kPa as saturated vapor. Determine the isentropic efficiency of the turbine. Use the steam tables from the FE

Reference Handbook.

Solution: First, find the inlet enthalpy (h_1) and entropy (s_1) from the superheated steam table at 2 MPa and 300°C. From the handbook, $h_1 \approx 3023.5$ kJ/kg and $s_1 \approx 6.768$ kJ/kg·K. For an isentropic process, $s_{2s} = s_1 = 6.768$ kJ/kg·K. At the exit pressure of 50 kPa, find the entropy of saturated vapor (s_g). From the saturated water table at 50 kPa, $s_g \approx 7.594$ kJ/kg·K. Since s_{2s} (6.768) is less than s_g (7.594), the final state is in the wet region. The quality (x_{2s}) is calculated: $x_{2s} = (s_{2s} - s_f) / (s_{fg}) = (6.768 - 1.091) / (6.503) \approx 0.873$. Now find the isentropic enthalpy: $h_{2s} = h_f + x_{2s} * h_{fg}$. At 50 kPa, $h_f = 340.6$ kJ/kg and $h_{fg} = 2305.4$ kJ/kg. So $h_{2s} = 340.6 + 0.873 * 2305.4 \approx 2352.7$ kJ/kg. The actual exit state is saturated vapor, so $h_2 = h_g$ at 50 kPa = 2646.0 kJ/kg. Isentropic efficiency, $\eta = (h_1 - h_2) / (h_1 - h_{2s}) =$

$(3023.5 - 2646.0) / (3023.5 - 2352.7) = 377.5 / 670.8 \approx 0.563$ or 56.3%. This problem demonstrates the importance of using the steam tables correctly and understanding how to handle wet steam in an isentropic process.

Sample Question 3: Mechanics of Materials

Problem: A 1-meter long steel rod ($E = 200$ GPa) with a circular cross-section of diameter 20 mm is subjected to a 50 kN tensile load. Calculate the total elongation of the rod.

Solution: The axial deformation formula is $\delta = (P * L) / (A * E)$. First, find the cross-sectional area: $A = \pi * d$
