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UNDERSTANDING CAUSE AND EFFECT IN SECOND GRADE

- The flowers wilted because _____. (Effect: they didn't get any water.)

These worksheets encourage students to think critically and produce language, which supports both comprehension and writing skills. Many **second grade cause and effect worksheets** in this style include picture clues to support emerging readers.

Picture-Based Worksheets

Visual learners thrive with picture-centric activities.  - What caused the flat tire? (Answer: The bike was left in the driveway and dad’s car ran over it.)
 - What was the effect of leaving the bike out? (Answer: The bike got a flat tire.)

These examples show the variety that keeps students engaged while repeatedly practicing the same cognitive skill.
