## Oedipus

He failed, and she was lost forever.

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## LEGENDARY MONSTERS AND CREATURES

The Gorgons were three sisters with snakes for hair, brass claws, and wings of gold. The most famous, Medusa, was the only mortal one. Anyone who looked directly at her face would turn to stone. Perseus famously slew her using a mirrored shield.

# Centaur

Mythical creatures with the upper body of a human and the lower body of a horse. While most centaurs were wild, lustful, and violent, there were notable exceptions, most famously Chiron, who was wise, knowledgeable in medicine and prophecy, and the tutor of many heroes like Achilles, Asclepius, and Heracles.

# Chimera

A fire-breathing hybrid creature, the Chimera had the head of a lion, the body of a goat, and the tail of a serpent or dragon. It terrorized Lycia until it was slain by the hero Bellerophon riding the winged horse Pegasus.

# Cerberus

The three-headed dog who guarded the gates of the underworld, preventing the dead from leaving and the living from entering. Capturing Cerberus alive was the last of the twelve labors of

Heracles, a feat he accomplished without weapons.

## Sirens

Dangerous creatures, often depicted as women with bird-like features or beautiful women on an island, the Sirens lured sailors to their deaths with their enchanting music and voices. Odysseus famously had his crew plug their ears with wax while he himself

was tied to the mast to hear their song without being lured away.

## Pegasus

The winged horse, Pegasus, was born from the blood of Medusa after she was slain by Perseus. He was later tamed by the hero Bellerophon, who used him to fight the Chimera. Pegasus was eventually placed among the stars as a constellation.
