Chilton has been a household name among DIY enthusiasts and professionals for decades. While their printed manuals are less common today, their digital labor guide remains a trusted resource. Chilton labor times tend to be slightly more conservative, which some smaller shops prefer because it allows for a small buffer on unfamiliar jobs.

Motor Information Systems

Motor publishes a comprehensive labor guide that has been a staple in the industry for generations. Their times are widely accepted in insurance claims and warranty work. Many collision repair shops use Motor labor times as part of their estimating process.

You might wonder how someone decides that a timing belt replacement should take 3.8 hours instead of 3.5 or 4.0. The process is more scientific than many realize. Labor time publishers employ experienced technicians who perform the actual repairs on test vehicles. They follow factory procedures and use standard shop tools. "All guides are the same."

Different publishers may list slightly different times for the same job. Mitchell, ALLDATA, Chilton, and Motor can vary by a few tenths of an hour. These differences matter, especially for large jobs. A shop should be transparent about which guide they use and why. Most shops pick one guide and stick with it for consistency.
