SECTION-BY-SECTION BREAKDOWN OF THE DRUM TABS

The song structure is: Intro / Verse 1 / Chorus / Verse 2 / Chorus / Bridge / Guitar Solo / Outro. We'll analyze the drum patterns for each.

1. The Intro: Building Tension

The song famously begins with a single, ominous guitar note and a lone hi-hat. The **drum notation** for the intro is minimalistic. For the first eight bars, Charlie Watts plays only the hi-hat with the foot pedal, creating a steady "chick, chick, chick" on beats 2 and 4 (the backbeat). There is no snare, no kick drum. 2. Verse 1: The Groove Emerges

When the full band kicks in, the drum pattern becomes the classic rock foundation. The **drum tabs for the verse** are straightforward but require precision:

- **Kick drum:** Plays on beats 1 and 3 (quarter notes) with occasional eighth-note variations. Listen for the slight syncopation on the "and" of beat 3 in some bars.
- **Snare drum:** Backbeat on beats 2 and 4. Solid and consistent.
- **Hi-hat:** Eighth notes (1-and-2-and-3-and-4-and), played with a tight, closed foot. Accent the "and" of beat 2 and 4 subtly to create a swing-like feel.

- **Ride cymbal:** Not used in the verse; stick to hi-hat.

The key is the **drum groove** - it must feel laid-back but driving. Watts never rushes. The **drum pattern** in the verse is a simple four-on-the-floor kick with a solid backbeat, but the ghost notes are minimal. Focus on the placement of the kick drum. In bars 5-8 of the verse, Watts adds a kick drum hit on the "and" of beat 4 leading into the next bar. Look for this in any accurate **drum tab**.

3. Chorus: Opening Up

The chorus kicks in with the iconic "Rape, murder, it's just a shot away" line. The drums become slightly more aggressive. The **Gimme Shelter drum tabs for the chorus** typically show:

- **Kick drum:** More active. Often plays a pattern like: 1, 3, & of 3, 4 (listen to the push).
- **Snare drum:** Still on 2 and 4, but hit a bit harder. Sometimes a flam or a rim shot for emphasis.
- **Crash cymbal:** Accents on beat 1 of each chorus bar, often paired with a choked hi-hat.
- **Hi-hat:** Opens slightly on the "and" of beat 4 to let more air in before the next downbeat.

The chorus has a feeling of urgency. Watts uses a simple but effective fill at the end of the chorus to transition back to the verse. The fill is typically: snare (on beat 3), snare (on beat 4), then a crash on the next bar's downbeat. Learn these **drum fills** precisely.

4. Bridge and Guitar Solo: Controlled Chaos

The bridge ("I tell you love, sister, it's just a kiss away") is a quieter section that builds tension again. The **drum tabs here** often revert to a simple hi-hat and snare pattern, similar to the intro but with a soft kick drum on the downbeats. Watts uses a lot of space again. Then the guitar solo explodes. The **drumming during the solo** is the most intense part of the song. Charlie plays a driving rock beat with a strong emphasis on the ride cymbal instead of the hi-hat. The **drum notation** for this section:

- **Ride cymbal:** Eighth notes, heavy and driving.
- **Kick drum:** Busy pattern, often playing a "gallop" feel: 1-&-a-2-&-a-3-&-a-4 (listen closely).
- **Snare:** Backbeat still holds, but Watts adds a ghost note or a buzz on the snare occasionally to add texture.
- **Fills:** Short, explosive fills around the kit. A typical **drum fill** near the end of the solo involves a tom run: floor tom (beat 4), rack tom (beat 1 of next bar), crash cymbal.

The solo section builds to a fever pitch. Watts plays with incredible intensity without ever losing the pocket. Analyze **Charlie Watts' drum technique** here: he uses his wrists, not arms, for speed and

control.

5. Outro: The Storm Breaks

The outro is where the song reaches its climax. The "War, children, it's just a shot away" repeats over and over. The drum part becomes almost a solo in itself. The **Rolling Stones Gimme Shelter drum tabs for the outro** are complex. Watts plays a driving eighth-note pattern on the ride cymbal, while the kick drum becomes relentless. The snare adds a chatter with ghost notes. This is where many drum tabs show a variation of:

- **Snare drum:** Still on 2 and 4, but with added ghost notes on the "ands" of 1 and 3.
- **Ride cymbal:** Steady eighth notes, with occasional crash accents every two bars.
- **Hi-hat:** Foot plays quarter notes (beats 2 and 4) to lock in the backbeat feeling.

The outro has a frantic, almost tribal feel. The best way to learn this section is to listen to the raw mix from the "Let It Bleed" album and feel the push and pull. The **drum groove** here is the epitome of rock drumming power.

TIPS FOR PLAYING "GIMME SHELTER" LIKE CHARLIE WATTS

1. **Master the Touch:** Charlie Watts played with a light touch. Hit the drums with authority but not force. The snare should crack, not smash.
2. **Focus on the Hi-Hat Foot:** The hi-hat foot work is critical. In the verse, keep the foot tight. In the chorus, release it slightly. Practice playing the hi-hat foot on 2 and 4 even when you are playing the ride cymbal.
3. **Listen to the Tambourine:** There is a tambourine shaking in the left channel for most of the song. Your drumming should lock with that tambourine's rhythm.
4. **Count the Dynamics:** The song goes from a whisper to a scream. Your volume should follow. The intro is barely audible; the outro should be thunderous.
5. **Use a Metronome:** The tempo is around 120 BPM. Practice each section slowly with a click, then gradually bring it up to speed.

Common Mistakes Drummers Make

- **Overplaying the Intro:** Many drummers add a kick drum too early. Resist. Let the tension build.
- **Too Much Cymbal:** In the verse, stay on the hi-hat. The ride cymbal is reserved for the solo and outro.
- **Rushing the Fills:** The fills are simple. Don't speed up. Lay back and let the fill breathe.
- **Ignoring the Ghost Notes:** The ghost notes on the snare are what give the groove its

texture. They are often overlooked in basic **drum tabs** but are crucial.
