large pizza, and more energy drinks.

This diet is not a healthy recommendation for the average person. It was a survival mechanism for a man burning 5,000 to 6,000 calories during training alone.

## Nutritional Strategy and Timing

Behind the shocking volume, there was a logic to the **Michael Phelps diet and workout** plan. The food choices were heavily focused on carbohydrates.
