In a practical sense, this value has driven many Ilocanos to excel in various fields, from agriculture and fishing to overseas employment, where their reputation for diligence often precedes them. Understanding Ilocano values like *nagaget* helps explain their significant contributions to the Philippine economy and their success in global diaspora communities.

2. Pigsa ti Panagurnong: Frugality and Resourcefulness

Closely linked to hard work is the value of *pigsa ti panagurnong*, which translates to the strength of saving or frugality. Ilocanos are known for their careful management of resources. This is not about stinginess but about wisdom and prudence. The Ilocano saying "*Ti uray no bassit, no maurnong, dumakkel*" (Even if it's small, if saved, it will become big) perfectly encapsulates this value. It reflects an understanding that resources are finite and must be used wisely to secure the future.

This value manifests in everyday life: simple living, avoiding unnecessary expenses, and prioritizing needs over wants. It also fosters a culture of saving and investing for the future, whether for children's education, a family home, or a

business venture. *Pigsa ti panagurnong* is a practical response to the region's historical scarcity and a testament to the Ilocano foresight. It teaches the importance of long-term planning over instant gratification, a lesson that remains incredibly relevant in today's consumer-driven world.

3. Panagbiag iti Naimbag: The Pursuit of a Good and Moral Life

Panagbiag iti naimbag means living a good life, but in a deeply moral and spiritual sense. It encompasses integrity, honesty, and uprightness. This value is rooted in the Ilocano belief that one must live in a way that is pleasing to God, respectful of others, and beneficial to the community. This principle often guides decision-making. An Ilocano farmer might choose to sell his crop at a fair price even if he could get more from a dishonest middleman. A merchant might give honest weight to her customers. These actions are not just business decisions; they are expressions of *panagbiag iti naimbag*. It is a value that builds trust within the community and ensures that social harmony is maintained. Understanding this moral compass is crucial for appreciating the deeper

4. Panagraem: Deep Respect for Elders and Authority

Respect, or *panagraem*, is a cornerstone of Ilocano society, particularly for elders (*lallakay* and *babbaket*). 5. Panagyaman:

This is closely tied to *panagbiag iti naimbag* and the Ilocano tendency to find joy in simple things. Ilocanos are taught from a young age to express thanks for food, blessings, and acts of kindness. This gratitude is not passive; it is often expressed through reciprocity and helping others.

This value fosters contentment and a positive outlook, even in difficult circumstances. An Ilocano family may not have much material wealth, but they will be deeply grateful for their health, their family, and their faith. *Panagyaman* is a powerful antidote to envy and materialism. It strengthens community bonds, as grateful individuals are more likely to share and support one another. This value is a key reason why Ilocano communities often maintain strong social ties, even when spread across different countries.

THE EXPRESSION OF ILOCANO VALUES IN DAILY LIFE
