

Who Plays The Tweenies Characters

Milo: The Gentle and Thoughtful Friend

Milo, distinguished by his green spots and slightly more reserved personality, was the thinker of the group. He was gentle, curious, and often approached problems with careful consideration. The performer behind Milo was **Curtis Lashley**. Curtis provided the voice for Milo and also operated the puppet. His performance gave Milo a sweet, slightly hesitant quality that endeared him to audiences. Milo's gentle nature was a lovely counterbalance to Fizz's exuberance and Bella's confidence, and Curtis Lashley's nuanced portrayal made the character feel incredibly real. Jake: The Cheeky and Playful Little Brother

HUMAN CHARACTERS AND THEIR PERFORMERS

The performers in the Tweenies were masters of this craft, and their dedication is why the characters felt so alive and genuine.

The performers who played the Tweenies characters have left a lasting legacy. For many children, these were the voices and movements that soundtracked their early years.
