Responsory

Following the psalms, a short biblical reading (the Little Chapter) is proclaimed. This is usually a verse from Scripture that speaks of Mary or of the mystery of the Incarnation. A brief responsory follows, allowing the community or the individual to respond in praise.

The Hymn or Canticle

At certain hours, notably Lauds and Vespers, a Gospel canticle is included. Lauds uses the Benedictus (the canticle of Zechariah), and Vespers uses the Magnificat (the canticle of Mary herself). The Magnificat, in particular, is the crown of the Little Office, as it is Mary's own song of praise. The office also includes the antiphon *Salve Regina* (Hail, Holy Queen) at the end of Compline.

The Collect and Conclusion

Each hour concludes with a collect prayer, which varies according to the season or feast. The office ends with the versicle "Let us bless the Lord" and the response "Thanks be to God."

THE LITTLE OFFICE VS. THE DIVINE OFFICE: KEY DIFFERENCES
