Unlike federal holidays—such as Independence Day or Thanksgiving—training holidays are often added around those dates to create longer weekends or to provide recovery time after major exercises. The **Fort Carson Training Holiday Schedule** typically includes a mix of:

- Training holidays linked to federal holidays (e.g., the Friday after Thanksgiving)
- Extended breaks during the winter holiday season (e.g., Christmas through New Year's)
- Occasional four-day weekends tied to unit-specific events or garrison-wide stand-downs

These holidays are not automatic days off; they must be authorized by the commanding general or equivalent authority. # Difference Between Federal Holidays and Training Holidays

It is important to distinguish between a federal holiday and a training holiday. Federal holidays are mandated by law and apply to all government employees, including most military personnel. Examples include Memorial Day, Labor Day, and Veterans Day. On these days, the installation typically operates with minimal staffing, and most soldiers receive a pass unless on duty.

Training holidays, on the other hand, are a garrison or unit-level decision. They often fall on a Monday or Friday adjacent to a federal holiday to create a four-day weekend. However, they can also be scheduled independently. For instance, Fort Carson may declare a training holiday on a Tuesday or Thursday to break up a long stretch of demanding training. The **Fort Carson Training Holiday Schedule** is usually published quarterly or annually by the garrison command and disseminated through unit leadership, official websites, and the Fort Carson mobile app.

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## HOW THE FORT CARSON TRAINING HOLIDAY SCHEDULE IS CREATED

3. **Community and family considerations** – The garrison works with Family Readiness Groups (FRGs) and Morale, Welfare, and Recreation (MWR) to ensure holidays align with school calendars and community events.
4. **Safety and accident prevention** – Historically, the Army uses training holidays to reduce risk during high-travel periods (e.g., Thanksgiving and summer months). The schedule often reflects a desire to mitigate holiday-related accidents and fatalities.

Once the draft schedule is created, it is staffed through command channels and eventually approved by the Fort Carson commanding general. The finalized **Fort Carson Training Holiday Schedule** is then published in the garrison policy memorandum, on the Fort Carson official website, and in unit newsletters. Soldiers are encouraged to verify their unit's specific implementation, as some

commanders may adjust the schedule slightly for operational needs.

### **TYPICAL DATES AND PATTERNS IN THE FORT CARSON TRAINING HOLIDAY SCHEDULE**

While exact dates change each year, certain patterns are common at Fort Carson. Based on historical schedules and typical Army-wide guidance, soldiers can generally expect the following holiday periods:

- **Martin Luther King Jr. Day (January)** – Usually a three-day weekend with a training holiday on Friday or Monday.
- **President’s Day (February)** – Often observed as a four-day weekend, with a training holiday on the preceding Friday or following Monday.
- **Memorial Day (May)** – Typically a four-day weekend, with Friday as a training holiday.
- **Independence Day (July)** – Depending on the day of the week, Fort Carson may add a training holiday on the adjacent weekday.
- **Labor Day (September)** – Almost always a four-day weekend with a training holiday on Friday.
- **Columbus Day / Indigenous Peoples’ Day (October)** – Occasionally a training holiday, though not universal.
- **Veterans Day (November)** – May be a training holiday depending on the year and unit mission.
- **Thanksgiving (November)** – The Wednesday before Thanksgiving or the Friday after is often a training holiday, creating a four- or five-day break.
- **Winter Holiday Block Leave**

**(December - January)** – The most significant period. Most units observe a block leave or training holiday period from around 23 December through 1 January, sometimes extending into the first week of January.

Additionally, Fort Carson sometimes schedules a training holiday on the Monday after the army’s annual “Green Weenie” or after major field training exercises. These are less predictable and published closer to the event.

### **IMPACT OF TRAINING HOLIDAYS ON UNIT OPERATIONS AND SOLDIER READINESS**

Training holidays are not just about time off—they are a readiness tool. Research and experience show that regular rest periods improve cognitive function, reduce burnout, and lower the risk of mishaps. For units at Fort Carson, training holidays:

- Allow junior leaders time to conduct administrative tasks (e.g., counseling statements, awards, evaluations) that often fall by the wayside during high-tempo periods.
- Give equipment and vehicles a break from intensive use, enabling maintenance teams to catch up on repairs.
- Provide soldiers with opportunity for check rides, medical appointments, and legal assistance that are harder to schedule during training weeks.

However, training holidays also require careful planning. Soldiers are still subject to recall if mission requirements change. Furthermore, many units require

personnel to complete “holiday briefings” before departing—covering safety, driving, alcohol consumption, and sexual harassment prevention. These briefings are a mandatory part of the **Fort Carson Training Holiday Schedule** compliance.

## Training Holidays and Family Life

For military families, the Fort Carson Training Holiday Schedule is a lifeline. It provides predictable times when a soldier will be home for full days, not just evenings after duty. Family Readiness Groups often organize events during holiday weekends to strengthen community bonds. Soldiers should also monitor the Department of the Army civilian holiday schedule, as many training holidays align with federal closures of administrative buildings (e.g., DEERS offices, finance, and personnel centers). However, note that a training holiday does not mean the entire post is closed—dining facilities, medical clinics, and security operations maintain minimum staffing.

### COMMON MISCONCEPTIONS ABOUT TRAINING HOLIDAYS

Despite the clear benefits, several misconceptions persist about the **Fort Carson Training Holiday Schedule**. Clarifying these can prevent frustration:

- **Misconception 1:** “Training holidays are mandatory days off.”

Reality: Block leave is a period when units grant consecutive leave days, often during the winter or summer. Training holidays are single days or long weekends without training, but do not necessarily authorize leave. However, many units combine block leave with training holidays to maximize time off.

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## TIPS FOR SOLDIERS AND FAMILIES TO MAXIMIZE TRAINING HOLIDAYS

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To truly benefit from the Fort Carson Training Holiday Schedule, proactive planning is key. Consider the following:

- **Plan travel early:** Airfare and accommodation near Colorado Springs can spike around holiday weekends. Book as soon as the schedule is announced.
