
Will I Lose Weight On The Paleo Diet

Furthermore, social situations can be difficult: dining out, attending parties, or eating at a friend's house can become stressful. WHAT THE RESEARCH SAYS

Scientific studies generally support the effectiveness of the Paleo diet for weight loss, at least in the short term. A 2014 meta-analysis published in the *European Journal of Clinical Nutrition* found that participants following a Paleo diet lost an average of 3.5 kg (about 7.7 lbs) over a period of two to six months, along with significant reductions in waist circumference and blood pressure. Another study in *Diabetologia* showed that a Paleo diet improved glucose tolerance and insulin sensitivity more than a standard diabetes diet, suggesting it may be particularly helpful for those with metabolic

the Paleo diet. However, many of these studies are small and of short duration, making it difficult to draw conclusions about long-term weight loss maintenance. A 2019 review pointed out that while Paleo diets can lead to weight loss and health improvements, adherence tends to drop off over time, and the weight loss is not necessarily greater than that achieved with other balanced diets like the Mediterranean diet. So, will you lose weight on the Paleo diet? The evidence suggests that you likely will, but the amount and sustainability depend on how well you stick with it.

TIPS FOR MAXIMIZING

PALEO

1. **Focus on Non-Starchy**

Vegetables: Fill half your plate with vegetables like leafy greens, broccoli, bell peppers, cauliflower, and asparagus. They are low in calories but high in volume, fiber, and micronutrients.

2. **Choose Lean Protein**

Intake: Include healthy fats like avocado, olive oil, and nuts, but use them sparingly.

Measure your oil when cooking, and opt for a small handful of nuts rather than a whole cup.

4. **Limit Starchy Vegetables and**

Fruits: While potatoes, sweet potatoes, and bananas are Paleo-friendly, they are also higher in carbohydrates and calories. If weight loss is your goal, treat them as occasional side dishes rather than main

components.

5. **Avoid "Paleo" Processed**

Foods: Many companies now sell Paleo-certified snacks like bars, cookies, and crackers. These are often still calorie-dense and can sabotage your efforts. Stick to whole foods as much as possible.

6. **Practice Intermittent Fasting Responsibly:**

Some people find that combining Paleo with intermittent fasting accelerates weight loss. You can try a simple 16:8 fasting schedule (eating

only within an 8-hour window) but ensure you still get enough nutrients.

7. **Stay Hydrated and Sleep Well:**

Water supports metabolism and helps manage hunger. Sleep deprivation can increase cravings and lower your willpower, so aim for seven to nine hours per night.

COMPARING PALEO TO OTHER DIETS
