Have the student complete the next set of problems while you watch. Provide hints and corrections as needed, but encourage them to do the work.

Resist the urge to give them the answer immediately. Ask guiding questions instead: "What is the first thing you need to undo?" "What is the opposite of that operation?"

Step 4: Independent Practice with Checking

Now, let the student work through a section of the worksheet on their own. After they finish, they should check their answers against the answer key. The key is not just to mark right or wrong, but to analyze any mistakes. If they get a problem wrong, they should rework it step by step to find the error. This metacognitive process is where deep learning occurs.

Step 5: Review and Repeat
