Note that some Model 80 DL rifles were produced with a box magazine that could be removed for loading, while others used a tubular magazine under the barrel. The box magazine version is often referred to as the Model 80 DL "Box Magazine" variant, and it is slightly less common than the tubular version.

# Ammunition Selection

The Marlin Model 80 DL is designed to fire .22 Short, .22 Long, and .22 Long Rifle ammunition interchangeably in tubular magazine models. The box magazine version typically only accepts .22 Long Rifle. For best results, use high-velocity or standard-velocity .22 LR ammunition from reputable brands like CCI, Federal, or Remington. Avoid using "hyper-velocity" loads like Stinger or Velocitor in very old rifles to reduce stress on the action.

## COLLECTOR VALUE AND MARKET TRENDS
