ANNE RICE CLAIMING SLEEPING BEAUTY: THE EROTIC REIMAGINING OF A CLASSIC TALE

The novel continues the story of Beauty and Prince Alexi, now older and ruling the kingdom together. It also introduces new characters and explores the next generation of the fantasy world. Rice stated in interviews that she wanted to revisit the trilogy because she felt there were more stories to tell. The response from fans was overwhelmingly positive, and Rice followed it with *Beauty's Kingdom, Volume II* in 2016. This revival introduced the series to a new generation of readers and reaffirmed Rice's place as a pioneering voice in erotic literature.
