need improvement.

TEST

American Government

This is the largest section and forms the foundation of the test. You will need to demonstrate knowledge of the Constitution, the three branches of government

(Legislative, Executive, Judicial), and the key principles of democracy. Questions may include:

- What is the supreme law of the land?
- What does the Constitution do?
- Name one branch or part of the government.
- Who is the Commander in Chief of the military?

Master this section, as it typically contains the highest number of questions in any **Sample 100 Question Citizenship Test**.

History

This category covers major events, periods, and figures from early colonization to the Civil Rights Movement. You should be familiar with the colonial period, the Revolutionary War, the drafting of the Constitution, the Civil War, and World War II. Common questions include:

- Who wrote the Declaration of Independence?
- What did the Emancipation Proclamation do?
- What major event happened on September 11, 2001, in the United States?

This section covers geography, symbols, and holidays. You will need to identify states and territories, know the capital of the United States, and recognize national symbols like the flag and the Statue of Liberty. Sample questions include:

- Why does the flag have 13 stripes?
- When do we celebrate Independence Day?

HOW TO EFFECTIVELY USE A SAMPLE 100 QUESTION CITIZENSHIP TEST

Understanding that the answer is the Constitution will help you respond correctly regardless of how the question is framed.

Neglecting the Official USCIS Resources

Only Studying the Questions

You Know Language Requirement

BEYOND THE SAMPLE TEST: ADDITIONAL PREPARATION TIPS

While a **Sample 100 Question Citizenship Test** is central to your study plan, combining it with other methods will reinforce your learning and build deeper civic knowledge.

Create Flashcard S

Write each question on one side of an index card and the answer on the other. Shuffle the deck daily and practice until you can answer each one instantly.

Digital flashcard apps like Anki or Quizlet offer pre-made decks based on the USCIS 100 questions and allow you to practice on your phone during a commute or break.

Watch Videos and Listen to Podcasts

Many organizations provide free video lessons that explain each of the 100 questions in detail. Videos can help visual learners, while podcasts are useful for auditory learners who want to practice listening comprehension.

Hearing the questions and answers spoken aloud improves your ability to understand the officer during the interview.

Take a Practice Interview

Some local libraries, immigrant resource centers, and legal aid clinics offer mock citizenship interviews. Participating in a simulated interview with a volunteer who acts as the USCIS officer gives you real-time feedback on your answers and your demeanor. This is an excellent way to reduce anxiety and identify any remaining weak points.

Study the N-400 Application

The civics test is only part of the interview. The officer will also review your N-400 Application for Naturalization form with you. Be familiar with the information you provided, including your travel history, employment record, and family details. The officer may ask you clarification questions based on your application. While a **Sample 100 Question Citizenship Test** does not cover this, it is vital to prepare for the entire interview process.

WHAT HAPPENS IF YOU DON'T PASS?

It is important to know that you get a second chance. If you do not pass the civics test during your initial interview, USCIS will schedule a second interview, usually within 60 to 90 days. You will be retested only on the portions you failed. Use this time wisely. Return to your **Sample 100**

Test and focus intensely on the questions you missed. Many applicants pass on their second attempt after targeted study.

Do not let fear of the test discourage you. The naturalization test is designed to ensure you have the basic knowledge needed to participate in civic life, not to trick you
