It is highly readable and has become popular in academic settings. However, it too lacks comprehensive footnotes. Yusuf Ali’s work remains superior for those who want a translation that doubles as a book of knowledge.

In summary, the Quran Translation By Yusuf Ali holds a middle ground: it is more interpretative and explanatory than Pickthall, more elaborate than Sahih International, and more classic in style than Abdel Haleem. This distinct position explains why it has remained in print for nearly a century.
