Answer: The Data Model allows you to build relationships between multiple tables and create more sophisticated

PivotTables. It is essential for working with large datasets from different sources without using VLOOKUP formulas.

Question 18: What does the TRIM function do?

Answer: TRIM removes extra spaces from text except for single spaces between words. This is extremely useful for cleaning data imported from other systems.

Question 19: How do you combine text from two cells into one?

Answer: Use the & operator or the CONCATENATE function. For example, =A1 & " " & B1 or =CONCATENATE(A1, " ", B1). In modern Excel, you can also use TEXTJOIN or simply =A1 & B1.

Question 20: What is the difference between SUMIF and SUMIFS?

Answer: SUMIF adds cells based on a single condition. SUMIFS adds cells based on multiple conditions. For example, =SUMIFS(C2:C10, A2:A10, "Product A", B2:B10, "East") sums values in column C where column A is "Product A" and column B is "East".

Answer: INDEX-MATCH or XLOOKUP. For example, =XLOOKUP(1053, A2:A100, D2:D100) returns the salary for that employee. XLOOKUP is the modern replacement for both VLOOKUP and HLOOKUP.

You have a list of student scores and need to assign a letter grade based on the following scale: 90+ = A, 80-89 = B, 70-79 = C, 60-69 = D, below 60 = F. How can you do this automatically?

Answer: Use a nested IF function or the IFS function. For example: =IFS(A1>=90, "A", A1>=80, "B", A1>=70, "C", A1>=60, "D", TRUE, "F"). The IFS function is cleaner than nested IFs.

KEYBOARD SHORTCUTS EVERY EXCEL USER SHOULD KNOW

- **Ctrl + C / Ctrl + V:** Copy and paste.
