
How To Make Evaporated Milk

STEP-BY-STEP GUIDE: HOW TO MAKE EVAPORATED MILK

Follow these steps for a reliable, foolproof method. The process takes about 25–35 minutes, depending on the amount of milk you start with.

Step 1: Measure Your Milk

Start with the desired amount of whole milk. Keep in mind that the milk will reduce to about 40% of its original volume. For example, if you need 1 cup of evaporated milk, you will need to start with 2½ cups of fresh milk. Here is a

quick reference:

- To make **1 cup evaporated milk** → Start with **2½ cups fresh milk**
- To make **1½ cups evaporated milk** → Start with **3¾ cups fresh milk**
- To make **2 cups evaporated milk** → Start with **5 cups fresh milk**

Use a liquid measuring cup for accuracy. This ratio accounts for the water loss and ensures you end up with the right concentration.

Step 2: Simmer

the Milk

Pour the fresh milk into a heavy-bottomed saucepan. Place it over medium heat and bring it to a gentle simmer. Watch carefully: you want to see small bubbles forming around the edges, not a rolling boil. Boiling vigorously can cause the milk to scorch or develop a thick skin. Once it is simmering, reduce the heat to low or medium-low to maintain a steady, gentle bubble.

Stir the milk occasionally with a whisk or wooden spoon to prevent a skin from forming on the surface and to ensure even heating. If a skin does form, you can either whisk it back in or use a fine-mesh strainer later.

Step 3: Reduce the Milk

Allow the milk to simmer gently, stirring every few minutes. The liquid will slowly decrease in volume and thicken slightly. The process typically takes 20-30 minutes for 2½ cups of milk. You will notice the milk taking on a slightly creamy color and a pleasant, nutty aroma. This is the natural caramelization of the milk sugars (lactose) at work.

To check if it has reduced enough, pour the milk into a liquid measuring cup. It should measure roughly 40% of the original volume. For

example, 2½ cups should reduce to about 1 cup. If it is still too much, return it to the pan and simmer a few more minutes. If you overshoot and it becomes too thick, you can stir in a tablespoon of fresh milk to adjust the consistency.

Step 4: Strain and Cool

Once the milk has reached the desired volume, remove the pan from the heat. If any skin has formed, pour the milk through a fine-mesh strainer into a clean bowl or directly into your storage container. Allow it to cool to room temperature. As it cools, it may thicken a

little more.

Step 5: Store Properly

Transfer the homemade evaporated milk to an airtight container. It will keep in the refrigerator **for up to 5 days**. Shake or stir well before using, as some separation occurs naturally. For longer storage, you can freeze it in ice cube trays (each cube is about 2 tablespoons) and transfer the frozen cubes to a freezer bag. Frozen evaporated milk can be used for up to 3 months.

TIPS FOR PERFECT HOMEMADE

EVAPORATED MILK

Here are some expert suggestions to help you achieve the best results when learning how to make evaporated milk:

- **Use a heavy-bottomed pan.** This distributes heat evenly and prevents the milk from scorching. A nonstick saucepan also works well.
- **Do not walk away.** Milk can foam up quickly and boil over. Stay nearby and adjust heat as needed.
- **Add a pinch of baking soda?** Some cooks add a tiny pinch ($\frac{1}{8}$ teaspoon per cup of milk) to help prevent curdling and improve the

stability of the milk, especially when using low-fat varieties. This is optional.

- **Make it dairy-free.** Oat milk and soy milk reduce well, though the flavor will be slightly different. Coconut milk can also be reduced but will impart a coconut taste.
- **Scale up or down easily.** The reduction ratio is consistent. Just maintain the 2.5:1 starting to finished volume ratio.

HOW DOES HOMEMADE EVAPORATED MILK COMPARE TO

Canned evaporated milk is sterilized at high temperatures, which gives it a shelf life of months without refrigeration.

Homemade evaporated milk, in contrast, is not sterilized and must be refrigerated. However, the flavor and texture of homemade are often superior. The gentle simmering process allows you to control the caramelization – you can stop earlier for a milder taste or let it reduce a bit more for a deeper, nuttier flavor.

Another key difference: commercial evaporated milk often contains stabilizers like dipotassium phosphate and carrageenan to prevent separation. Your homemade version may separate slightly in the fridge,

but a quick **CANNED?** shake brings it back together perfectly.
