Answer: John Adams and Thomas Jefferson. Both men were among the five members of the Committee of Five that drafted the Declaration of Independence, both served as president, and both passed away on the 50th anniversary of the Declaration's adoption. Adams's last words were reportedly, "Thomas Jefferson survives," unaware that Jefferson had died hours earlier.

Answer: This was an agreement reached during the Constitutional Convention that counted three-fifths of the enslaved population for purposes of both representation in Congress and taxation. It was a deeply contentious compromise that was later rendered obsolete by the Thirteenth and Fourteenth Amendments. It remains one of the most controversial aspects of the

original Constitution.

Answer: Rhode Island. It did not ratify until May 29, 1790, nearly three years after the Constitution was signed. As an original holdout, Rhode Island was

grants Congress the power to make all laws that are "necessary and proper" for carrying out its enumerated powers. This clause has been the basis for expanding federal authority in areas like banking, transportation, and healthcare.

Answer: It has been amended 27 times. The first ten amendments are the Bill of Rights, and the most recent amendment—the Twenty-seventh—was ratified in 1992.
