

How To Set Homepage On Chrome

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INTRODUCTION: WHY SETTING YOUR CHROME HOMEPAGE MATTERS

Your browser’s homepage is the first thing you see every time you open Google Chrome. It’s your digital starting point, and tailoring it to match your habits can save you time, reduce friction, and boost your productivity. Whether you want immediate access to a search engine, a specific news site, or a blank page for a fresh start, learning **how to set homepage on Chrome** is one of the simplest yet most impactful browser customizations you can make. In this guide, we’ll walk you through every method—desktop, mobile, and even using startup pages—so you can take full control of your browsing experience.

UNDERSTANDING HOMEPAGE VS. STARTUP PAGE IN CHROME

Before diving into the steps, it’s important to distinguish between two similar but distinct features in Chrome:

- **Homepage** – The page that loads when you click the home button (a small house icon) in your toolbar.
- **Startup page** – The page or set of pages that Chrome displays when you first launch the browser.

Many users confuse the two. By learning **how to set homepage on Chrome** correctly, you can decide whether you want the home button to take you to a specific URL, and separately, what Chrome shows when it opens. The steps to configure each are slightly different, and we’ll cover both.

METHOD 1: SETTING YOUR HOMEPAGE ON CHROME (DESKTOP - WINDOWS, MAC, LINUX)

Step 1: Open Chrome Settings

Launch Google Chrome on your computer. Click the three vertical dots in the top-right corner of the window (the **Customize and control Google Chrome** menu). From the dropdown, select **Settings**.

Step 2: Navigate to the “On startup” Section

On the left sidebar, click **On startup**. Here you will see three options:

1. **Open the New Tab page** – Shows Chrome’s default new tab page.
2. **Continue where you left off** – Reopens all tabs from your previous session.
3. **Open a specific page or set of pages** – This is where you add your desired homepage URL(s).

For most users who want a custom homepage, selecting **Open a specific page or set of pages** is the right choice.

Step 3: Enable the Home Button

Still in Settings, go to the **Appearance** section (you can find it on the left sidebar or scroll down). Look for **Show Home button** and toggle it on. By default, the home button shows the New Tab page, but you can change it.

Step 4: Customise the Homepage URL

After enabling the home button, you’ll see a text field labeled **Enter custom web address**. Type the URL you want to use as your homepage (e.g., <https://www.google.com> or <https://www.wikipedia.org>). Click **Save** (or simply press Enter).

Pro tip: You can also set the homepage to show your bookmarks bar or a blank page by typing about :b̸ank in the address field.

Step 5: Verify the Change

Click the home icon (the house) in your toolbar. It should instantly navigate to the URL you set. If you also want Chrome to open that page when you start the browser, you must revisit the “On startup” section and add the same URL under “Open a specific page.”

METHOD 2: SETTING YOUR HOMEPAGE ON CHROME FOR ANDROID (SMARTPHONES & TABLETS)

Chrome for Android also allows you to define a homepage, though the interface is slightly different from the desktop version.

Step 1: Open Chrome and Access Settings

Tap the three-dot menu at the top-right (or bottom, depending on your layout) and select **Settings**.

Step 2: Find the Homepage Option

Scroll down to the **Advanced** section and tap **Homepage**. You can toggle the homepage on or off.

Step 3: Choose Your Homepage

Once toggled on, you have two choices:

- **New Tab page** – The default Chrome new tab.
- **Enter custom web address** – Type the URL of your choice.

Select “Enter custom web address,” type your desired site, and tap **Save**. Now, when you tap the home icon on the toolbar, it will open that page.

METHOD 3: SETTING YOUR HOMEPAGE ON CHROME FOR IOS (IPHONE & IPAD)

Apple’s iOS has its own restrictions, but Chrome for iOS still offers a homepage in the form of a “Startup page.”

Step 1: Open Chrome Settings

Tap the three-dot menu (bottom-right on iPhone, top-right on iPad) and choose **Settings**.

Step 2: Look for “New Tab Page” or “Homepage”

Under the **“New Tab Page”** section, you can choose what appears when you open a new tab: your most visited sites, bookmarks, or a specific page. Unfortunately, Chrome for iOS does not have a traditional home button; the new tab page serves as your functional homepage.

To set a custom URL, you can use bookmarks and pin them, but for a true “homepage” experience, you may need to set your desired page as your startup page via the **“Startup”** option (if available) in Settings > On startup.

METHOD 4: SETTING MULTIPLE HOMEPAGES (STARTUP PAGES) IN CHROME

If you regularly use several websites – say Gmail, Google Calendar, and a news portal – you can set Chrome to open all of them each time you launch the browser. Here’s how:

1. Go to **Settings > On startup**.
2. Select **Open a specific page or set of pages**.
3. Click **Add a new page** and enter the first URL. Repeat for each page you want.
4. You can reorder or delete pages by clicking the three dots next to each entry.

This is extremely useful for professionals who need instant access to multiple tools.

BONUS TIPS: MAKING THE MOST OF YOUR CHROME HOMEPAGE

Use a Blank Page for Speed

If you want Chrome to load instantly without fetching content, set your homepage to about :b̸ank. This is especially beneficial on older computers or slow internet connections.

Pin Tabs for Persistent Access

Instead of setting a homepage, you can right-click a tab and select **Pin**. Pinned tabs remain open and take up minimal space. When you restart Chrome, they reopen automatically (if you have “Continue where you left off” enabled).

Set a Custom New Tab Page

Extensions like **Momentum**, **TabMania**, or **Infinity New Tab** replace Chrome’s default new tab with a personalized dashboard containing your homepage, weather, to-do list, and more. While technically not a “homepage,” many users treat it as such.

TROUBLESHOOTING COMMON HOMEPAGE ISSUES

“Chrome Keeps Changing My Homepage”

If your homepage resets unexpectedly, it could be due to malware, an unwanted extension, or another program overriding your settings. Run Chrome’s **Clean up computer** tool (Settings > Reset and clean up > Clean up computer) and review your extensions. Remove any you don’t recognize.

Home Button Not Visible

Make sure you’ve enabled the home button in Settings > Appearance > Show Home button. If the button is still missing, try disabling and re-enabling it, or restart Chrome.

Mobile Homepage Not Saving

On Android, ensure you’ve actually tapped **Save** after entering the URL. On iOS, remember that the “New Tab Page” acts as the homepage; you must manually configure it. If problems persist, clear Chrome’s app cache from your device’s settings.

Chrome Flags or Beta Versions

If you’re using Chrome Beta, Dev, or Canary, some settings may behave differently. Stick to the stable version for the most predictable experience.

WHY YOU SHOULD SET A HOMEPAGE - BEYOND CONVENIENCE

Setting a homepage is not just about saving a few clicks. It’s about designing your digital environment to align with your priorities. For example:

- **Productivity** – Start your work session directly in your email or project management tool.
- **Focus** – Use a minimal homepage to reduce distractions.
- **Habit building** – Set your homepage to a site that reminds you of a daily goal (e.g., language learning platform).
- **Child safety** – Configure a kid-friendly homepage on a shared device.

Knowing **how to set homepage on Chrome** empowers you to take control of your browsing habits rather than letting default pages dictate your flow.
