The Core Moral Teachings: A Radical Ethic

These statements are a manifesto for a new kind of character. They do not praise power, wealth, or success, but humility, grief for the world's brokenness, a desire for justice, mercy, and the courage to make peace. Jesus is redefining what it means to be "blessed" or truly happy.

*THE PRINCIPLE OF RADICAL LOVE AND FORGIVENESS*

At the heart of Jesus's morality is the command to love. He distilled the entire Jewish law into two principles: "Love the Lord your God with all your heart and with all your soul and with all your mind," and "Love your neighbor as yourself." He extended this principle in the Parable of the Good Samaritan, where he defined "neighbor" not as a fellow Jew or a friend, but as anyone in need, even an enemy or a foreigner.
