making him an unforgettable villain. The film's greatest strength is its atmosphere. The cinematography is gloomy and rain-soaked, perfectly reflecting the protagonist's internal storm. Differences Between the Book

and the Movie

**THEMATIC ANALYSIS:
IDENTITY, RAGE,
