The **bearded vulture**, also known as the lammergeier, is a unique scavenger that drops bones from heights to crack them open and eat the marrow. For sheer size, the **bustard** is among the heaviest flying birds; the great bustard can weigh over 20 kilograms. Game birds like the **bronze turkey** and the **blue grouse** are also part of this category. And of course, the **barn owl**, with its heart-shaped face and silent flight, is a spectacular nocturnal predator that helps control rodent populations.

Reptiles and Amphibians Starting with B

Reptiles and amphibians are not always the first creatures people think of when listing **animals starting with letter B**, but they hold their own in terms of intrigue. Insects and Arachnids with a B

The **bird spider** (often called the Goliath birdeater) is a large tarantula that, despite its name, rarely eats birds but is an impressive predator of insects and small vertebrates.

Other tiny B animals include the **book louse**, a very small insect that feeds on mold and fungi in damp environments, and the **bristletail**, a primitive wingless insect that resembles a silverfish. The **botfly** is a parasitic fly that lays its eggs on mammals, and the larvae burrow into the skin to develop. While they seem frightening, these insects are part of complex ecological webs where every species has a role.

Unique and Lesser-Known Animals Starting with B

Beyond the well-known species, there are many unusual **animals starting with letter B** that may surprise readers. The **axolotl** does not start with B, but the **blind cave fish** does.
