Garlic

Garlic contains allicin, a compound with strong antiviral and antimicrobial properties. It is believed that applying garlic to a skin tag can help dry it out and cause it to shrink and fall off. To use this remedy, crush a fresh clove of garlic to make a paste. Apply a small amount of the paste directly to the skin tag, being very careful to avoid the surrounding healthy skin. Cover it with a bandage and leave it on for a few hours or overnight. Some people recommend doing this for three to five days. Like ACV, raw garlic can be quite potent and can cause skin burns or blisters. If you feel a strong burning sensation, wash it off immediately. This method is not suitable for sensitive skin.

Banana Peel

This is one of the gentlest and safest methods for learning **how to remove skin tags at home**. The theory is that the enzymes and antioxidants in banana peel help to dry out the skin tag. To use, cut a small piece of ripe banana peel, about the size of the skin tag. Place the inner side of the peel against the tag and secure it with a bandage or medical tape. Leave it on overnight. Repeat this nightly until the tag falls off, which can take several weeks. This method is very low-risk but requires consistent patience, as it is the least potent of the natural remedies.

Vitamin E Oil

Vitamin E oil is known for its skin-nourishing and healing properties. To use, simply apply a small amount of vitamin E oil directly to the skin tag and massage it gently for a minute. Leave it on without rinsing. Do this two to three times daily. This method is very safe and can be used on sensitive areas, but it is not an aggressive treatment and may take a long time to produce results, if any.

Castor Oil and Baking Soda

This combination creates a paste that is thought to help dry out the skin tag. Mix a small amount of baking soda with a few drops of castor oil to form a thick paste. Apply this paste directly to the skin tag and cover it with a bandage. Leave it on for a few hours or overnight. Rinse with warm water. Repeat daily for several weeks. This method is generally safe but can be drying to the surrounding skin, so be careful with application.
